### I. Course Description

English 1302/Composition II is a course designed to teach the principles and techniques of written, expository, and persuasive composition; analysis of literary, expository and persuasive texts; and critical thinking. Course will include analysis of prose readings, expository writing and investigative methods of research. Readings will include the main literary types. A more intensive application of grammar will be required in an effort to improve the correctness and precision of the student's writing.

- Develop ideas and synthesize primary and secondary sources within focused academic arguments, including one or more research-based essays;
- Apply the conventions of style manuals for specific academic disciplines (e.g., APA, CMS, MLA, etc.) including the proper use of quotations, citations, and a list of works cited;
- Write in a style that clearly communicates meaning, builds credibility, and inspires belief or action;
- Demonstrate continuing mastery of Edited American English when articulating ideas in well-organized, lucid prose that exhibits the application of the aforementioned skills.
