Title: ENG 2322: Survey of British Literature I

Course Catalog Description

Presents significant works of British literature from the Old English period through Neoclassicism.

Course Overview

In this class, you will read works from **The Middle Ages** through the **Restoration and Eighteenth Century**. However, you will not simply read specific works, but rather, you will explore various aspects of historical periods; understand how the assigned works reflect changing social, political, and religious thoughts of each period; and then compare themes from era to era. Along with reading, analyzing, comparing and contrasting various literary works, students will also be required to write a number of analytical, literary papers using proper MLA format.

Course Objectives

1. Identify the characteristics and significance of the generally accepted periods of British literature: Old

English, Medieval, Renaissance, and the Neoclassical.

- 2. Read works from a variety of genres: epic, poetry, fiction, and drama.
- 3. Compare, contrast, and synthesize works and ideas in a perceptive fashion.
- 4. Express results of literary analysis in a clear, well-organized style.
- 5. Understand the relation of a work to its period and to British literature as a whole.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course the student will be able to:

- 1.0 Recognize the major movements and periods of British literature from the Old English period through Neoclassicism.
- 2.0 Read and analyze both masterpieces and secondary works of British literature.
- 3.0 Demonstrate knowledge of literary genres and terminology.
- 4.0 Identify the characteristic elements that relate literary works to the whole of British literature.
- 5.0 Communicate an understanding of British literature and its general history through papers, projects, and examinations that are written in clear, well-organized prose.

Required Materials

Textbook: The Longman Anthology of British Literature. 4th ed. Volume 1.

3 Ring Binder: In order to be successful, students must be organized. To this end, students are required to maintain a three-ring binder for this course. Notebooks will be separated into reader response sections, sections for note-taking, vocabulary, etc.

Novels: Students will be required to read a number of novels **outside of class**. Students will be required to write book reports over these novels and be prepared to test over the novels periodically during the course of the semester. Students will also be expected to contribute to class discussions over the novels.

NOTE: This is a college level course; subsequently, it is imperative that students be prepared for the extra work that is required. Students **must** be willing to devote the outside time needed to keep abreast of the class work involved. It is estimated that for every hour spent in the classroom, and additional hour of homework is required.

Plagiarism/Cheating:
