Course Description: Topics may include introductory treatments of sets, logic, number systems, number theory, relations, functions, probability and statistics. Appropriate applications are included. This course is designed primarily for liberal arts majors. (ICOs 1, 3) *Prerequisite:* MATH 0375 passed with a "C" or better, or satisfactory placement score.

TEXTBOOK: A Survey of Mathematics by Angel, Abbott, Runde. 9th Ed. *This Text is Recommended*. MyMathLab access is *Required* for this course.

Homework: All homework for this course will be completed using the MyMathLab software at http://pearsonmylabandmastering.com. The Course ID for this class is walker03085. There will be an assignment for each section of the book covered. Computer access is available several places on campus including the Math Lab (ET120) and the Learning Resource Center.

Quizzes: There will be un-announced quizzes given periodically in the class. There will likely be more that 10, but only your best 10 scores will be counted for the grade.

Exams: There will be 4 exams for the class (Chapters 2, 3, 4, 5) and 1 final exam which will cover all 4 chapters. Students will be given sufficient notice of any date changes for these exams.

 - provide clear information about grading policies and assignment requirements in the course syllabus, and
 - communicate any changes to assignments and/or to the course calendar to students as quickly as possible.
- 3. As an instructor, I understand that I need to provide regular, timely feedback to students about their performance in the course. To keep students informed about their progress, I will
 - return classroom activities and homework within one week of the due date and
 - provide grades for major assignments within 2 weeks of the due date or at least 3 days before the next major assignment is due, whichever comes first.

Reasonable Expectations of Engagement for Students
