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Course Description

The purpose of this course is to help students attain a requisite level of technical and musical proficiency on the trumpet and demonstrate mastery of those skills through performance.

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Course Objectives

To provide fundamental trumpet skills including the following:

- Basic tone production, including proper use of breath and breath support encompassing a range of approximately two and one-half octaves at all dynamic levels
- Development of clean, accurate, and variable attacks at all dynamic levels within a range of approximately two and one-half octaves
- Theoretical knowledge and musical application of major and all forms of minor scales and accompanying arpeggios
- Confidence and consistency that will insure that performances are relatively free from technical restrictions
- Lip slurs and flexibility studies based upon a solid theoretical understanding of the harmonic series
- Analysis of solo and etude material including, but not limited to: phrase and harmonic structure, form, and both melodic and harmonic development of musical material
- Sight reading studies, stressing musical and technical accuracy

• Incorporation of the various components of music (i.e. history, theory, ear training) in performance situations

Required Readings/Materials

 - Assigned Solo Material Students must purchase their own original copies of assigned solo literature within a week of the literature being assigned.

Course Requirements (Lectures, Assignments and Assessments)

- Students must attend fifteen applied lessons during the semester to complete the course.
- Three unexcused absences from applied lessons will result in an "F" for the semester.
- Students will maintain a weekly practice journal and bring the completed journal to each lesson.
- The Department of Music requires two performances during the course of the semester and a final jury examination at the end of each semester.

The Final Exam, or Jury will be a combination grade and will be based on a skills exam and any solo repertoire pieces assigned to you during the semester.
