<u>Course Description</u>: Applied Piano MUAP (1270.999) is a course for piano majors designed to present musical knowledge as applied to the keyboard and to develop basic skills related to playing the piano. Fundamental keyboard skills will include sightreading, transposition, scales, chords, harmonization, arpeggios, ensemble playing and solo repertoire.

<u>Course Objectives</u>: To provide fundamental keyboard skills which include sightreading, transposition, scales, chords, harmonization, arpeggios, and performance/interpretation of solo repertoire.

<u>Course Requirements</u>: Consistent class attendance is extremely important. Consistent practice outside of class as instructed is required. OC provides both electronic and acoustic pianos for "homework" practicing.

<u>Exams</u>: You will be given a weekly grade on assignments given. The Final Exam will be a combination grade and will be based on a skills exam and any solo repertoire pieces assigned to you during the semester.

Attendance: You will receive a weekly grade B either a 100 or a 0. You get two free absences, i.e., two 0=s will be dropped at the end of the semester.

<u>Piano Recital</u>: Performance on the OC Piano Recital is not mandatory, but is encouraged. Recitalists will be chosen by Ms. Bizzell based on performance readiness.

<u>Jury</u>: Piano Majors will perform 2-3 selections of contrasting style for the music faculty.

<u>Grading Policy</u>: Final grades for the course will be based upon attendance and your willingness to complete the assignments given, calculated as follows:

Attendance: 20% Weekly Assignments: 60% Final: 20%

- 2. As an instructor, I understand that my students will work to the best of their abilities to fulfill the course requirements. In order to help them in this area, I will

- provide clear information about grading policies and assignment requirements in the course syllabus, and
- communicate any changes to assignments and/or to the course calendar to students as quickly as possible.
- 3. As an instructor, I understand that I need to provide regular, timely feedback to students about their performance in the course. To keep students informed about their progress, I will
  - return classroom activities and homework within one week of the due date and
  - provide grades for major assignments within 2 weeks of the due date or at least 3 days before the next major assignment is due, whichever comes first.

#### **Reasonable Expectations of Engagement for Students**

- 1. As a student, I understand that I am responsible for keeping up with the course. To help with this, I will
  - attend the course regularly and line up alternative transportation in case my primary means of transportation is unavailable;
  - recognize that the college provides free wi-fi, computer labs, and library resources during regular campus hours to help me with completing my assignments; and,
  - understand that my instructor does not have to accept my technical issues as a legitimate reason for late or missing work if my personal computer equipment or internet service is unreliable.

  - attend class regularly to keep up with assignments and announcements.
