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## **Course Description**

Basic methods and techniques for various riding events such as rodeo, drill, and speed event horses. The course will cover rider preparation for performance, basic equipment and riding style. (SCANS 5,9,10)

### **Course Objectives**

After completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate competency in:

- 1. Horse grooming
- 2. Hoof care
- 3. Saddling and bridling techniques.
- 4. Basic riding skills used in rodeo, drill, show and speed events.

**CLASS ACTIVITIES:** participation in class discussions and group activities are mandatory. Test questions will be taken from notes of the class lectures, riding instruction and handouts for notebook entry.

- 1. Parts of the Horse
- 2. Parts of the saddle and other related equipment.
- 3. Basic grooming skills including clipping and hoof care.
- 4. Equipment fit for the horse and rider.
- 5. Ground work.
- 6. Basic riding commands, maneuvers and skills.

  - provide clear information about grading policies and assignment requirements in the course syllabus, and
  - communicate any changes to assignments and/or to the course calendar to students as quickly as possible.
- 3. As an instructor, I understand that I need to provide regular, timely feedback to students about their performance in the course. To keep students informed about their progress, I will
  - return classroom activities and homework within one week of the due date and
  - provide grades for major assignments within 2 weeks of the due date or at least 3 days before the next major assignment is due, whichever comes first.

  - attend the course regularly and line up alternative transportation in case my primary means of transportation is unavailable;
