Course Description

Advanced methods and techniques for riding events such as rodeo, drill, show and speed events. The course will cover rider preparation for performance, equipment used and riding style. The course will also cover training techniques for young horses. (SCANS 5,9,10)

Course Objectives

After completion of this course, the student will be able to demonstrate competency in:

- 1. Different riding and training techniques of the various events.
- 2. The use of various equipment used in training young horses.
- 3. Training of a young horse from the round pen to more advanced maneuvers such as

reining.

CLASS ACTIVITIES: The student will train a young horse from the ground work through the saddling and riding processes. The student will advance the horse in training as far as time will allow in one semester. Upon successful completion of Beginning Horsemanship, Intermediate Horsemanship and this course, the student will be presented with a certificate of completion of the horse training program.

This class meets only one day per week for observation by the instructor, but the horses will be ridden at least five days per week on your own time for approximately one hour. A note book or journal will be kept consisting of all activities that take place in the training of the horse and be presented for part of the final grade.

 - provide clear information about grading policies and assignment requirements in the course syllabus, and
 - communicate any changes to assignments and/or to the course calendar to students as quickly as possible.
- 3. As an instructor, I understand that I need to provide regular, timely feedback to students about their performance in the course. To keep students informed about their progress, I will
 - return classroom activities and homework within one week of the due date and
 - provide grades for major assignments within 2 weeks of the due date or at least 3 days before the next major assignment is due, whichever comes first.
