Course Description:

Introduces the student to sociological concepts, theories and new ways of thinking about social issues such as poverty, inequality and deviance. It allows the student to examine various social institutions and their contributions to social life; identifies the social groups that make up society; and explores the significance of culture and social structure for understanding human behavior. Internet course is also available. (ICOs 1,2,5,6)

Course Objectives:

After completing this course, the student will:

- 1. Understand the sociological perspective and the scientific method;
- 2. Understand the nature of society and culture and their role in shaping human thought and behavior;
- 3. Understand the socialization process of humans from birth to death;
- 4. Understand the nature of social groups and organizations and their importance for individuals and society;
- 5. Understand the nature of deviance and social control;
- 6. Be able to explain stratification as a characteristic of all societies and the bases for stratification, including economics, race/ethnicity, gender and age;
- 7. Be able to identify and understand the functions of the major societal institutions;
- 8. Have knowledge of Demography and the consequences of human population growth;
- 9. Understand the dynamics of social change;
- 10. Understand the concept of globalization and its implications for individuals, society and the world:
- 11. Be familiar with numerous organizations and websites that are relevant to the field of sociology.
- 12. Have enhanced Information and Communication Technology skills.

Required Material:

The text for the course is <u>Society:</u> the <u>Basics</u> (11th ed.) by John Maciones. **ISBN-13: 9781256415985** for <u>Maciones</u>, <u>Society:</u> The <u>Basics</u>, 11e <u>Books</u> A la Carte + NEW **MySocLab Making the Grade.** This provides students with a 3 ring binder and access code which include many study resources as well as an audio and e book to accommodate your different learning styles. Course ID information will be available on the first day of class.

The course is designed in a modular format. Each week includes one module that contains assignments for that week. "Week" will be from Sunday to Sunday. See Weekly Modules button.

Module 1 will be open until Sunday, September 9 (for 2 weeks) so that everyone has time to get a great start in the course.

For the rest of the semester, however, your work/assignments for each Module are posted on Sunday of the week indicated and all work must be completed by midnight the <u>following</u> Sunday (1 week).

So, as you can see, Modules 1 and 2 BOTH must be completed by Sunday, August 9, midnight.

Computer skills:

Students should be able to navigate the Internet and conduct required research, create word processing documents and navigate the course web site. Students must also be able to use email, attach files and use various features of Blackboard.

Specific Policies and Procedures:

Student Success Support/Success Coaches:

The Odessa College Student Success Coaches will help you stay focused and on track to complete your educational goals. If an instructor sees that you might need additional help or success coaching, he or she may submit a Retention Alert or a Starfish Alert. A Student Success Coach will contact you to work toward a solution.

Checking in to the Course – students are required to check in to the course at least 3 times each week. The course entry page is the Announcements page. Students should also check their OC email accounts and the General Discussion Board at least 3 times each week. You should read all posts there.

Submitting assignments – writing assignments will be prepared in word processing documents and saved in files that are submitted through Blackboard. They will NOT be accepted by email. All documents should be double spaced and have your name of them. You should also conduct a spell – check on all assignments. Save a copy of all assignments on a flash drive.

Attendance policy:

You must go into the course at least 3 times each week. Please note that if you fail to check into the course at least 3 times each week, 10 points will be deducted from your final grade.

Communication Policies:

Students should use the **General Discussion board** (accessible under all Modules) for all communication related to the course. This includes questions, comments, and requests for clarification. Please note, however, if the answer to a student question is to be found within the course web site, she will be returned to the site to continue to look for the answer to the question.

Students must put their names and SOCI 1301 on all emails. Weekly Announcements and emails to students inform you of the week's assignments

If you email the instructor, she will respond in a very timely manner. You are expected to acknowledge her reply and indicate that she has addressed your concern. You should therefore check email for a response if you sent the instructor an email.

Do not use a texting style of communication/writing ("c u"; "ur") in group discussion nor in Writing Assignments. This is a college class, and academic writing is expected.

Late Submission Policy:

Late work is not accepted except under special circumstances. Acceptance of late work is up to the instructor's discretion. If you feel you have a unique situation/circumstance that prohibits your meeting a deadline, you should communicate it to me privately via email. Students are strongly encouraged to communicate any problems to the instructor in a timely manner.

Incomplete Policy:

A grade of "Incomplete" may be given only if (1) the student has passed all work completed, and (2) he/she has completed a minimum of 75% of the required coursework. A grade of "I" will only be assigned when the conditions for completions have been discussed and agreed upon by the instructor and the student. A contract between student and instructor must be signed.

Instructor Response Time:

The instructor will respond to emails and bulletin board posts with 24 - 48 hours of receiving them. If she will be unavailable for any length of time for any reason, she will post such a message in the announcements area and on the general Discussion Board.

Preparation for Computer Emergencies

Computer Crash

Server problems

When the Blackboard server needs downtime for maintenance, the Blackboard administrator will post an announcement in your course informing the time and the date. If the server experiences unforeseen problems your course instructor will send an email.

Complete Loss of Contact

If you lose contact with me completely (i.e. you cannot contact me via Blackboard or email), you need to call me at my office, 335-6555, and explain the reason you cannot contact me and leave me a way to contact you.

You must keep/save a copy of every project/assignment on an external disk or personal computer. - 3. As an instructor, I understand that I need to provide regular, timely feedback to students about their performance in the course. To keep students informed about their progress, I will
 - post grades for discussion postings within one week of the discussion thread closing.

• provide grades for major assignments within 2 weeks of the due date or at least 3 days before the next major assignment is due, whichever comes first.

Reasonable Expectations of Engagement for Students

- 1. As a student, I understand that I am responsible for keeping up with the course. To help with this, I will
 - line up alternative computer and internet access in case my primary computer crashes or my internet services is unavailable;
 - recognize that the college provides free wi-fi and computer labs during regular campus hours to help me with accessing my course; and,
 - understand that my instructor does not have to accept my technical issues as a legitimate reason for late or missing work if my equipment or service is unreliable.
- 2. As a student, I understand that it is my responsibility to communicate quickly with the instructor any issue or emergency that will impact my involvement with or performance in the class. This includes, but is not limited to
