**Course Objectives:** We will endeavor to discover how Western Civilization and the development of other countries have affected the development of Western Europe. We will also effort to achieve the General Education Curriculum Goals for History Courses as listed below:

There will be a major importance placed on the students ability to stay on pace with their reading and there will be several opportunities for students to demonstrate their ability to write about the material they have studied.

# Introduction of John McLemore...

As an instructor of American History, I believe it is important to look at history in as many different views as possible so we can form our own opinions. I believe there are some names and dates that are vital and must be learned because they help form a foundation of cause and effect and cause and effect is how I look at history. As we move through the semester I hope students will be able to discern the causes of different events and trends that have had long range effects. Our look at history will examine the social, political, institutional, and governmental changes that have come from the various causes and effects during the last one hundred and twenty five years of United States History. It is my goal, as an instructor, to have students' advances their reading, writing, and thinking skills in an effort to form their own opinions about World History. The ability to

form intellectual opinions on the various events of history allows students to become better citizens of the United States and more informed citizens of the world.

Requirements: The course break down is very simple. Students will read one chapter a week beginning August 27 and take one 25 question exam each weekend. This will include 13 exams worth a total of 100 points each for a total of 1300. There will also be one paper due at the end of the semester. This will be a short paper of five pages and it must cover a person, place, or event inside the time period of this course. The paper must be in complete sentences and well written in a size 12 New Times Roman font and be in a Word document and be in Rich Text Format. It will be worth 100 points and due on December 7, 2012. There will also be four map exercises worth 100 points each. There will also be 4 discussion questions that will have to be answered along with responses to two other postings. Each one of these will be worth 50 points for a total of 200.
