<u>Supplies</u>: <u>Scantrons</u>, a <u>pencil or pen</u>, and a <u>notebook</u> for <u>taking lecture notes</u>. <u>Bring your textbook(s)</u>, <u>pen/pencil</u>, <u>and notebook to every class</u>.

<u>Reading assignments</u>: You are expected to read any assigned readings <u>before</u> the lecture on each chapter. Pop quizzes may be given to chart your attention to this very important task.

<u>Participation</u>: Throughout the semester, each student MUST participate as "counselor" and "client" in mandatory in-class practice sessions that will be gently critiqued and reviewed by the instructor and class as a whole (this will not be a "slam-fest!"). These practice sessions are for you to practice and demonstrate knowledge and technique, but also for the <u>immensely</u> important need for experiential knowledge. You can study, observe, and monitor a rollercoaster from an emotionally detached position and cognitively recognize the mechanics of the rollercoaster understand and predict its actions and state its effects.... But you have <u>no idea</u> of what a rollercoaster <u>actually is</u> until you climb the steps, strap yourself in and take a ride....! Participation is mandatory. I will keep track of dates and participants. If you do not participate as both counselor and client – your grade will be reduced by up to 20%.

Grades: Tests: 60%; Term Project: 10%; Participation: 20%; Final Exam: 10%.

<u>Tests</u>: There will be 3 tests and a <u>comprehensive final exam</u>. Students are expected to take tests at the scheduled time. If you miss a test, <u>you will be responsible to make it up.</u> Makeup Exams are to be scheduled with the teacher and may be taken after class the following week. Should this not be suitable, it will be up to you to get with the instructor and explain what the holdup is. <u>If the story is accepted</u>, you may take it the next week. Although you can choose to not do a test, remember if will significantly affect your overall grade.

<u>Term Project</u>: The term project will be a well written paper on a subject to be announced later. There will be at least 2 or 3 options for you to choose from. The importance of proper spelling, grammar and punctuation cannot be emphasized enough. Lack of attention to these details will result in a lower grade.

<u>General Comments and Stipulations:</u> You must take personal responsibility for how well you do in this class. I will help you in any way I can – but you must do your part! Due to the potentially emotional and personal nature of this class, I must <u>insist</u> you demonstrate respect to each individual in the classroom. I do, however encourage critical thinking – express your thoughts and opinions and get involved in the classroom discussions!

NOTE TO THOSE IN EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES: I encourage people to be involved in different pursuits for leisure and fun and believe it is vital for mental and emotional well-being. However, balance is necessary! You will still be held responsible for the work involved in the classes you signed up for. No exceptions will be made for athletes, musicians, cheerleaders, Zen Buddhists, etc.

ATTENDANCE: Class attendance is <u>critical</u> for this class. <u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: A great deal of information will be presented during class that is not in your textbook, so if you miss a class, it is crucial that you get the notes from someone else because this information will be included on tests. It is very difficult to do well in this course unless you: 1) attend class, 2) actively listen, 3) take notes, 4) read assigned reading prior to the class it will be presented and 5) study your notes and the textbook material <u>between</u> class sessions. Do not be afraid to ask questions or to talk to me if you start having difficulty in the class. I realize that there are circumstances that make absences unavoidable. An absence will be excused if there is a bona fide emergency and/or an unavoidable circumstance, <u>and you notify me prior to, or the day of the absence</u>.


PERSONAL CONDUCT AND ACADEMIC HONESTY:

<u>Incompletes</u>: A grade of "incomplete" may be given only if (1) the student has passed all work completed, and (2) he/she has completed a minimum of 75% of the required coursework.
