Course Description:

This course is intended to present a basic understanding of psychological terms, theories, and methodologies. This scientific discipline focuses studies on behavior and mental processes, cognitive abilities and affective states. The main objective is to understand the history behind the discipline of psychology including how psychology evolved as a science, look at the various fields that comprise the discipline of psychology and study the different perspectives psychologist use to explain human behaviors. An overview will be given of research methods, basic biological functions, consciousness, theories of learning, memory, intelligence, personality theories, and classification of abnormal behavior.

Attendance: Students are expected to attend every class. You will earn points for attendance.
