Course Objectives

1. Graph supply and demand in a single graph, define basic items or concepts related to the graph, and use the graph to explain the process by which a good's equilibrium price and quantity are attained
2. Discuss the tradeoffs faced by an economy and how this relates to the concept of opportunity cost
3. Analyze graphically the marginal cost, average total cost, and average variable cost curves; explain the shape of each curve.
4. Analyze graphically the long-run profit maximizing output of a perfectly competitive firm, a monopolistic firm, a monopolistically competitive firm, and an oligopolistic firm; discuss the economic efficiency of each industry type.
5. Analyze graphically the long-run average total cost curve and explain economies of scale, diseconomies of scale, and constant returns to scale.

Discussion Assignments:

We will have **EIGHT** discussion assignments in this course. The discussions are not optional. receive a grade for your discussion and responses to the other students' comments. **You must participate in all discussion topics.**

The Discussion Assignments open on Monday every two weeks

Unit Exams:

Exams will be drawn from a pool of questions compiled by the instructor. There will be a pool for each chapter (sometimes several per chapter) within the unit. Students will be provided with a preparation sheet (located in Course Documents) that will tell you how many questions will be asked within a chapter or part with the chapter. Also a list of topics that each pool covers will be provided. The Exam will be made up of randomized questions by Blackboard by drawing the appropriate number of questions from each pool for each part. Therefore each exam will be **unique**. No student will have the same exam.

Warning: If you lock up an exam while taking it or you get knocked off the internet and the instructor has to unlock it. It will be cleared and you will not get the same exam when you start over. You will get a totally new exam. It is highly recommended that you take the exam on a reliable connection. (Preferably not dialup).

You will have 3 hours to complete the exam. You have to complete it in one sitting, since you can only open it once. Taking longer will cost you 10 points.

The unit examinations will open at Noon Sunday on the following dates:

and remain open till the following Tuesday at 5 PM.
