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Course Description

SPCH 1315 **Course Credits:** 3 hours

In this course, students learn to apply oral communication skills toward a specified audience. Organization of ideas, the persuasion process, and audience analysis are components of the course objectives. The student will demonstrate these objectives through prepared messages using appropriate verbal and nonverbal techniques. *Prerequisites:* None

Textbook The Art of Public Speaking, 9th or 10th Edition, Stephen E. Lucas

The student CD that accompanies book is not required. It is optional.

Learning Outcomes

- Students will learn several core concepts of professional speech.
- Students will demonstrate their knowledge of public speaking.
- Students will evaluate communication skills used in speaking.
- Students will learn skills to improve their ability to listen.

Course Assignments

Follow these instructions **carefully** and use all the resources available in BlackBoard, my web site, OC and the OC library to complete the assignments. Please email me if you have any questions about any of the work due in the class.

Student Information Assignment:

You will need to create a Word document with your student information that you will save and then submit under the Assignment tab in BlackBoard. Include the following:

- Your full name and hometown
- Your student email and personal email
- Home phone number and/or cell phone number
- Major course of study and any hobbies/Interests

Quizzes:

There are 5 (FIVE) 20-question multiple-choice and true/false quizzes that you will have 30 minutes to complete under the ASSIGNMENTS tab in BlackBoard. Each quiz will cover multiple chapters and notes for each chapter can be found at <http://www.professorspeakeasy.com/OdessaStudentPage.htm>

Introductory Speech:

Students will record a 1 to 2 minute speech introducing themselves to the class. You do not need to turn in an outline but you will need to post this video on YouTube. FOLLOW THE INSTRUCTIONS FOR POSTING YOUR VIDEO CAREFULLY. These will be made available to all of your classmates. Some information to share about yourself should be where you are from, your major or the classes you are currently taking, if you have any kids or pets, travels out of the country, favorite food and music and any hobbies or interests that you might have. The purpose of this assignment is to not only introduce each of the classmates to each other but also to make sure that all students can record and upload a speech video properly before the major speeches are due.

Informative Speech:

Students will develop a 5 to 7 minute informative speech using the Informative Speech outline guide posted online. Topic choice is determined by the student and there are suggestions posted online. This speech should have 3 main points unless you get approval from the instructor to do any other number of main points for your

topic. Using the ***Informative Outline Guide*** (posted on the class web site) you will develop your own ideas based on the information you gather while doing research on your topic. You will cite your sources verbally while speaking and you will cite these sources in a written format on your speech outline. You can use APA or MLA method to cite your sources on your outline but one method must be used. Help is available on the class web site on how to properly list your sources. There should be a clear introduction, transitions and conclusion in your speech. No paper is allowed on stage so you will need to write any notes for yourself on 3x5 note cards. **DO NOT READ YOUR SPEECH!** You must practice and rehearse the speech enough so that you can be conversational with the audience. Eye contact and vocal variety are very important elements to maintain during any speech and you will be evaluated on your delivery skills. ***You will post your outline in BlackBoard AFTER you have recorded your speech so that you can copy and paste the URL link to your speech video at the top of the outline.***

Persuasive Speech:

Students will build on what they learned from performing the informative speech to develop a 5 to 7 minute Persuasive Speech on the topic of their choice (with the exception of religion or abortion). Your speech goal should be to persuade your audience to change their belief or behavior. You will use Monroe’s Motivated Sequence and the ***Persuasive Outline Guide*** posted online to develop your ideas. Information from at least 3 published sources must be used within in your speech and you must properly cite these sources verbally in your presentation and on your outline. Work to choose a topic that you have a passion for because genuine enthusiasm for the issue will serve you well in your presentation. Persuasive delivery skills include all of those from the informative speech but your ability to be credible and create logical, effective persuasive arguments will be evaluated as well. The conclusion should include a specific request of tangible action from the audience to complete the motivated sequence. You are required to use a visual aid (Power Point, poster, handout, etc.) during the delivery of this speech. ***You will post your outline in BlackBoard AFTER you have recorded your speech so that you can copy and paste the URL link to your speech video at the top of the outline.***

Speech Analysis Paper:

You will write a 3 page paper over one or more of the speeches listed on the class web site under [Speeches to Watch](#). The paper should have 1 inch margins all around, be in Times New Roman 12-point font and double-spaced. You will analyze the speaker and speech (or speakers and speeches) and demonstrate your knowledge of the class concepts. Use vocabulary and terminology from the chapters to develop your ideas. This paper will consist of your perspective but should reflect your overall knowledge of the speech process. You will post this paper as Word Document in BlackBoard under Assignments. Any papers posted after the due date will have 10% deducted for each day late and will not be accepted more than 3 days late for any reason.

Final Exam:

There is a final exam due at the end of the class. You will take it just like you have taken the quizzes for this class. It is based on the quiz questions and it is comprehensive over all the chapters.

Hardware/Software Requirements

Computer:

A minimum of 64 MB RAM, 1 G of free disk space

150 MHz or higher recommended, a monitor capable of at least 800 x 600 resolution

Peripherals:

Speakers must be able to listen to audio files. Speakers must be able to record, upload, save and send their recorded speeches by the due date.

Anti-virus software is highly recommended for students and instructors. Online courses involve much file sharing, which increases your risk of computer virus infection. Anti-virus software will help protect your computer in case of exposure to a computer virus.

Other software:

You will need to use *Microsoft Office*, *Open Office* or *Google Documents* to create Word documents and PowerPoint presentations for this class. There is help with using Google Documents online and it is part of your student email account. Click on 'Documents' at the top left to begin using this free software suite once you have logged in to your OC student email account.

Internet connection: 56 K modem or better

Browser and settings: Microsoft Internet Explorer and Google Chrome work well with Blackboard on computers running the Microsoft Windows operating system.

Java and Cookies must be enabled. To enable follow these steps:

1. In Internet Explorer 6, go to the "Tools" menu and choose "Internet Options".
2. Choose the "Privacy" tab and move the slider to "Medium" (which is the default setting) to enable Cookies.
3. To enable Java (if not installed, first see next item "Java Plug-in for Windows..." or Java Plug-in for Macintosh" below), while remaining in the "Internet Options" window choose the "Advanced" tab.
4. Scroll down until you see the "Java (Sun)" item and check the box beside "Use Java...".
5. Click "OK".
6. You may need to close your browser and all other applications and restart your computer before this setting takes effect.

Announcements:

Read announcements each day and check student email account and BlackBoard at least every other day.

This class is entirely online and you will use BlackBoard to view the materials and complete the assignments. Speeches must be recorded and submitted by the due date in the formats described.
