

Course Syllabus for Government 2305 (11/S1)

Real politics are the possession and distribution of power. – Benjamin Disraeli

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Course objective: Since 1947, the Texas state legislature has required that public college and university students complete six semester-hours in American national, state, and local government. The survey course in national government is designed not only to meet that requirement but also to provide you with the basic knowledge and understanding of government activity at the federal level. This course should also give you a better understanding of certain germane disciplines such as history, sociology, philosophy, literature, and economics while preparing you for careers in teaching, public service and the law. You also benefit from taking a course such as this by not only learning how government affects your life but how you can affect public policy.

Examinations: During the course of the semester, there will be six short quizzes (or equivalent) and three unit examinations. A Scantron Answer Forms (882-E green) will be required for each exam. These examinations will be administered on (or about) the following dates: **14 June, 23 June, and 07 July**. The quizzes will occur at random.

Examination make-up policy: Remember that making up a missed examination is a privilege and **NOT** a right! If you have to miss an exam, see me for further instructions. Make-ups will be administered at the OC Testing Center. Keep in mind that there will be **NO** make-ups for the short quizzes and **NO** make-ups at all after the last date for drop-in testing at the Testing Center.

Grading policy: All examinations are equally weighted and will count for 4/5 (80%) of the course grade (your highest exam grade will count twice). The short quizzes/assignments will count for the other 1/5 (20%). Final semester grades will be based on the following averages: **90-100=A, 80-89=B, 70-79=C, 60-69=D, and below 60=F**. Also keep in mind that once a grade is assigned, it is **final!!!** The need to retain eligibility, please your parents, get into law school, med school, grad school, etc., may be important reasons to change a grade, but they are not valid. A final grade is just that – **final**.

Academic dishonesty: Cheating and/or plagiarism will not be tolerated. Suspected cheating or plagiarism may result in a reexamination in a controlled environment, a failing grade, or dismissal from the course. As per OC Board Policy the **option is with the instructor:** *In cases of academic dishonesty, the instructor has the authority to impose appropriate scholastic penalties.*

Drops/withdrawal: The last day to drop/withdraw with a “W” for this semester is **Wednesday 29 June**. Keep in mind that this is a student responsibility. Drops/withdrawals initiated after this date are granted in only the most extraordinary circumstances and are at my discretion.

Attendance policy: Attendance is mandatory and, along with class participation, can influence your final grade. Roll will be taken for every class period that we are not testing. If you are late to

class, it is your responsibility to make sure that you are not counted absent. All material covered in class is your (not my) responsibility. Excused absences may require documentation.

Bonus points: If you attend class, take notes, read the assigned material and study for the exams, “extra credit” is generally not necessary. However, since students often request opportunities for “extra credit,” I have decided to offer up to ten **pre-average** points for any **one** of the following:

- 1) by registering to vote if you are **not** currently registered
- 2) if you are already registered, encourage someone else (family member, friend, etc) to register
- 3) by voting in a national, state, or local election
- 4) by volunteering to work at the Parker House Museum
- 5) by donating blood (may be done by proxy)
- 6) by joining and participating in the Student Government Association

Documentation will be required and bonus points awarded at my discretion. Ten is the maximum.

Additional tips:

- Don't ask if you missed anything important when you miss a class ... or classes ... if it wasn't important, we wouldn't have talked about it
- Don't ask if this material will be on the exam ... you are responsible for everything that is covered in class
- Don't ask if there is anything that you can do to improve your grade (especially during the week prior to, of, and following the final exams) ... do what is required during the semester and you won't have this problem
- Do take advantage of office hours ... it's a good way to get to know the instructor and be remembered ... in a positive way
- Be aware that college is an adult environment ... lecture topics may include material that is somewhat controversial in nature as well as adult language and subjects
