II. Course objectives:

After completing this course, the student should be able to demonstrate competency in:

- E. Name some common sources of infection in the salon.
- F. Explain how an understanding of anatomy and physiology will help you become a better nail technician.
- G. Study of anatomy and physiology will include cells, tissues, organs, and systems of the human body.
- H. Identify the parts of the nail and nail disorders that cannot be serviced by a nail technician.

- I. Describe the characteristics of healthy skin.
- J. Demonstrate basic procedures for manicuring and pedicuring.
- K. Demonstrate your ability to perform a hand and foot massage.
- L. Identify the supplies needed for nail tips and explain what they are used for.
- M. Demonstrate the proper procedure and precautions for the application of acrylic nails over tips.
- N. Describe the proper procedure for removing acrylics.
- O. Describe the two basic types of gels, and demonstrate the procedures and precautions for gel and no light gel applications.

Expectations for Engagement – Face to Face Learning

- 1. Attend Class on a regular basis, whenever absent notify instructor. Attendance requirement: Students must attend 90% of class and lab time in order to obtain credit. If you are absent more than 6 days you will lose credit. You will only be allowed to make-up 4 absences.
- 2. Wear required uniform to be permitted to attend class and to receive credits.
- 3. Bring supplies and textbook daily.
- 4. Write a report on an assigned topic and possible report orally.
- 5. Complete exams covering specified unit material.
- 6. Perform in class, the skills taught in theory in an effort to reinforce learned knowledge.
- 7. Participate in class assignments by working on manikin, models, or another classmate and allowing other students to perform temporary services on them.
- 8. Keep a daily lab journal answering the following
 - 1. What did I do today?
 - 2. What problems did I have or did I find this an easy assignment
 - 3. What critiques did I receive, what do I need to work on
 - 4. Did I enjoy this assignment or do I see myself not performing this task in the real world?
 - 5. Pose any questions you have for me that pertain to the assignment.
 - 6. List any websites used in the assignment.

Grading Policy:

Each week, I will provide grades or scores and comments on assignments within 6 days of when they were submitted. After I send feedback each week, I will post a notification in the Main forum.

Assignments more than 5 days late will not be accepted. Technological issues will not be considered as valid grounds for late assignment submission.
