Course Objectives

Second semester of a two-semester sequence in organic chemistry for science majors, focuses on the syntheses and reaction mechanisms of aromatic, carbonyl, and biological compounds.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course the student will be able to:

- 1. Compare and contrast the structures, properties, and reactions of aromatic compounds, carbonyl compounds (aldehydes, ketones, carboxylic · acids, acyl halides, anhydrides, esters, amides), amines, carbohydrates, lipids, and amino acids.
- 2. Design syntheses for organic compounds and evaluate potential mechanistic problems associated with them.
- 3. Formulate and perform the laboratory synthesis, purification, and characterization of the organic compounds studied.

Homework
