Course Description:

Introduces the student to sociological concepts, theories and new ways of thinking about social issues such as poverty, inequality and deviance. It allows the student to examine various social institutions and their contributions to social life; identifies the social groups that make up society; and explores the significance of culture and social structure for understanding human behavior. (ICOs 1,2,5,6)

Student Learning Outcomes:

After completing this course, the student will be able to

- 1. Explain the sociological perspective, the scientific method, and 3 major theories in Sociology;
- 2. Analyze and explain various data regarding society, behavior and attitudes;
- 2. Recognize the nature of society and culture and their role in shaping human thought and behavior;
- 3. Describe the socialization process of humans from birth to death;
- 4. Understand the nature of social groups and organizations and their importance for individuals and society;
- 5. Understand the nature of deviance and social control:
- 6. Explain stratification as a characteristic of all societies and the bases for stratification, including economics, race/ethnicity, gender and age;
- 7. List and explain the purposes of the major societal institutions;
- 8. Explain Demography and discuss the consequences of human population growth;
- 9. Explain the dynamics of social change;
- 10. Understand the concept of globalization and its implications for individuals, countries and the world;

- 11. List several organizations and websites that are relevant to the field of sociology and sources of reliable information for college students.
- 12. Express increased confidence in basic digital literacy skills.

Required Materials:

The text for the course is <u>Society: the Basics (11th ed.)</u> by John Maciones. ISBN-13: 9781256415985 for <u>Maciones, Society: The Basics, 11e</u> Books A la Carte + NEW MySocLab Making the Grade. This provides students with a 3 ring binder and access code which include many study resources as well as an audio, e book and power points to accommodate your different learningstyles. Course ID information will be available on the first day of class.

How this Course is Set Up

The course is designed in a modular format. Each week includes one module that contains assignments for that week. "Week" will be from Sunday to Sunday. See Weekly Modules button. Weekly announcements include assignments for each week and you will get a weekly email about each week's assignments.

<u>Grades</u>

ALL grades are posted in Blackboard under the MYGRADES button. You should check grades frequently and contact the instructor if you have any questions.

Work in MYSOCLAB is NOT counted toward the final grade, but is for your personal learning needs.

Submitting assignments — weekly assignments will be prepared in word processing documents and saved in files that are submitted through Blackboard. They will NOT be accepted by email. All documents should be double spaced and have your name of them. You should also conduct a spell — check on all assignments. Save a copy of all assignments on a flash drive. Be sure to put your name on all assignments.

Communication Policies:

Please note, however, if the answer to a student question is to be found within the course web site, she will be returned to the site to continue to look for the answer to the question.

You must check into the course at least 3 times each week. Please note that if you do not, 10 points will be deducted from your final grade.

If you email the instructor, she will respond in a very timely manner. The same courtesy from students is encouraged. Please acknowledge instructor reply and indicate that she has addressed your concern. You should therefore check email for a response if you sent the instructor an email.

Late Submission Policy:

Late work is not accepted except under special circumstances. Acceptance of late work is up to the instructor's discretion. If you feel you have a unique situation/circumstance that prohibits your meeting a deadline, you should communicate it to me privately via email. Students are strongly encouraged to communicate any problems to the instructor in a timely manner.
