**Course Description**

A survey of world literature from the ancient world to the present. Students will study works of prose, poetry, drama, and fiction in relation to their historical and cultural contexts. Texts will be selected from a diverse group of authors and traditions.

- Final Exam objective test plus a 5-paragraph essay (each valued at 50% of the final exam grade)

Exams

Each module will end with a test that covers the reading from that unit; there are two tests in sum. Tests will be in essay format and will require you to answer a couple of questions. I would recommend preparing an outline prior to taking the test on Blackboard. The final exam will be given during the last week of class. More information about the final will be given as the semester progresses.

Essays

Two (2) essays will be assigned throughout the semester. The essays correspond with the module and will be the capstone for each course module. Prompts for the essays will be

distributed in class closer to the essays' due dates. All essays should be formatted in the MLA style, which means all essays must be typed and double-spaced in a standard font (Calibri, Times New Roman, etc.) with one-inch margins. Standard identifying information (student name, instructor name, course name and section number, and date due) should be in the upper left-hand corner of the first page – there is no need for a separate cover page. The page number with your last name should be on every page in the upper right hand corner. The title should be centered and correctly capitalized. Failure to adhere to these specifications may result in a point reduction on the essay. The MLA guidelines will be discussed at more length in class. Papers will be submitted to Blackboard. **Do not expect to receive a passing grade in the course if you do not turn in ALL essays.**

Class Participation

Part of your grade for the modules will be based upon the 10 postings due on Blackboard. The due dates for these postings are on the course schedule; these will take the form of reader responses. You will receive full credit for posting your own response and responding to another classmate's post.

Your postings should be at least three (3) paragraphs, and paragraphs should be at **least** five (5) sentences each. In these postings, you may review, respond to, and/or analyze the reading. You can write about just one selection, a few selections, or all – it's up to you and what piqued your interest. Refer to specific words, lines, and/or sentences in your postings.

When you respond to another classmate's post, you should write one (1) paragraph of at **least** five (5) sentences. You may compliment your classmate, ask questions about his/her response, and/or offer a different interpretation of the passage or work.

A few things to remember:

- Posts are visible to all classmates.
- You are encouraged to post on the date due by 11:59 pm; this will ensure you are up to date with course material and are progressing well.
- Postings receive full credit only if they are complete, insightful, and specific. They should show clear evidence that you have read carefully.
- Please read everyone else's posts to heighten your understanding and engagement with the text! The point is to see a variety of responses and interpretations of the text. And remember – there is not one "correct" interpretation of a piece of literature. As long as you can support yours with evidence from the text, it should be valid.

Postings and responses to postings are worth up to ten (10) points each, depending on the quality of your work and if you did both your own response and a response to a classmate's posting.

Courses of this nature work best when everyone participates in class discussions and group work. We will all learn best when we have all voices and opinions represented, but this means that you must treat your classmates with respect, even if you disagree with their opinions and ideas. If you are unwilling or unable to treat others with respect, you will speak with the department dean, and your future in this course will be in jeopardy.

NOTE:

For any 3-credit class, a student is expected to spend an average of 6-8 hours outside of class each week reading, writing, revising, and studying course materials. Throughout the semester, you will be required to devote a significant amount of time preparing materials for class. DO NOT expect to complete all of your work during class time. Lastly, do not expect to pass the class if you do not a) attend most of the class meetings and b) turn in all major assignments.

All dropboxes for **postings will remain open until the end of the module; however, any postings turned in late will receive a 10% penalty.** All dropboxes for **essays will remain open until the end of the 8-week semester; however, any essays turned in late will receive a 10% penalty.** Although I do offer these grace periods, please don't let late work become a habit. The rest of the class and my instruction will move along with the "on time" due dates, so continuing to turn in work by the "late" deadline will lead to procrastination and piled-up work. Simply put, do your best to stay on

top of the coursework and to meet deadlines; if there are extenuating, extreme circumstances, please talk to me during office hours.

Grade Inquiry Policy

It is the responsibility of the individual taking this course to maintain accurate track of assignment submissions and grades. There will be opportunities during the semester to meet with the instructor to discuss your academic progress. Contact the instructor to schedule an appointment. Class time will not be used for grade inquiries. All grades are final.
